AN ARCHAEOLOGY-INSPIRED YEAR

The Museum has definitely lived up to its name of late.
The spotlight has been on **archaeology** at Pointe-à-Callière since the beginning of the year, and this focus will continue for the next several months. It all started with *The Greeks – Agamemnon to Alexander the Great*, our tremendously popular exhibition that drew over 132,000 visitors, a record for the low tourist season. Visitors had a chance to admire 550 priceless artifacts from 21 Greek museums – a unique opportunity to see some real world heritage treasures.

OTHER DAZZLING EXHIBITIONS

With *The Aztecs, People of the Sun*, the emphasis is on archaeology once again, thanks to unique objects, artifacts and rare pieces paying tribute to the grandeur of this fascinating Mexican people. For this exhibition, 16 museums lent us exceptional objects rarely seen outside Mexico.

Later this year, the Museum will be opening a truly one-of-a-kind exhibition. *Investigating Agatha Christie* will look at the fascinating world of this prolific novelist and extraordinary woman in her day, whose exciting life and literary work were intimately bound up with archaeology. The world-renowned and widely loved novelist was married to archaeologist Sir Max Mallowan, and was directly associated with important archaeological discoveries at ancient Mesopotamian sites in Syria and Iraq. These experiences actually inspired several of her books. It's bound to be spellbinding, and we can already sense our visitors' excitement!

The Museum is also mounting *Fragments of Humanity*. *Archaeology in Quebec*, another exclusive and the first major exhibition devoted entirely to Quebec archaeology. Visitors will be able to admire over 200 significant objects illustrating 50 years of archaeological discoveries. A first!

ENCOURAGING THE YOUNGER GENERATION

The Pointe-à-Callière Foundation and the National Bank organized a new contest for Quebec high school students: *Archaeologist for a Day at Pointe-à-Callière!* We were delighted to host Annabelle Létourneau, the 13-year-old winner of the first edition of the contest. Annabelle attends Académie Dunton, a high school in Boucherville.

A HUGE PART OF MONTRÉAL'S IDENTITY

Archaeology is also our prime concern as we prepare to launch Phase 2 of the Museum's expansion plans. With financial support from the City of Montréal, teams are currently hard at work on showcasing our city's birthplace, with Fort Ville-Marie, the first French settlement built in 1642, Callière's Residence and the William collector sewer, a unique feat of civil engineering in North America. A new pavilion is being built right next door to the Museum in Place D'Youville, and the William collector sewer, to connect the new building with the current museum, will be consolidated and adapted. The archaeological dig campaigns prior to this work brought more than 320,000 objects and artifacts to light. This site, such a huge part of Montréal's history, will be a unique heritage legacy for Montréal's 375th anniversary, to be celebrated in 2017.

QUEBEC ARCHAEOLOGY

This year, the Museum also released the first in a series of five volumes devoted to Quebec archaeology: *AIR – Territoire et peuplement*, the first in the "Quebec archaeology" collection, has been very well received. Produced in partnership with the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications, it will be a tremendous reference for anyone interested in the findings of close to 50 years of archaeological research in Quebec. Finally, the Museum proudly participated in *Archaeology Month 2015*, in August, by offering various activities on Montréal's birthplace.

Since it opened in 1992, the Museum has been committed to preserving and bringing visitors to know and appreciate Montréal's birthplace, while making the remains and collections of artifacts and objects found during archaeological digs accessible. It is also part of the Museum's mission to offer temporary exhibitions presenting the most significant pieces from ancient civilizations. Archaeology interests and fascinates visitors of all ages, a fact clearly borne out by the Museum's attendance figures.

The Aztecs arrive at the Museum...

1 The successful official opening of The Aztecs, People of the Sun, on May 29, was attended by Francine Lelièvre, Executive Director of Pointe-à-Callière, Francisco Suàrez Davilà, Mexican Ambassador to Canada, Christine St-Pierre, Ouebec Minister of International Relations and the Francophonie, José Enrique Ortiz Lanz, National Co-ordinator for Museums and Exhibitions for the Mexican National Institute of Anthropology and History, and Francisco del Rio, Consul General of Mexico in Montréal. The exhibition, on until October 25, invites visitors to learn about a fascinating Mexican civilization. 4 Once again, the Museum was a victim of its own success during the exceptionally busy Montréal Museums Day organized by the Board of Montréal Museum Directors, now the Montréal Museums Society, on May 24. Nearly 7,000 people turned out to visit our various exhibitions, including the very popular *Snow!* and the family favourite *Pirates or Privateers?* And it was a beautiful day, too!

3/5th ANNIVERSARY


Pointe-à-Callière is working feverishly and enthusiastically toward its goal of inaugurating a new phase in its planned Montréal Archaeology and History Complex in time for Montréal's 375th anniversary celebrations, in May 2017: the pavilion housing the remains of Fort Ville-Marie and the William collector sewer. The project is made possible by a \$30 million subsidy from the City of Montréal.



It would be hard for visitors outside the Museum to miss the huge progress made on the expansion project to date. Workers are busy on the site between the Éperon building and the new pavilion. They have temporarily removed a few trees and the obelisk from Place D'Youville and are strengthening and waterproofing the William collector sewer and conducting archaeological digs. These essential preliminary phases will make it possible to erect the new pavilion, create a new gallery and rebuild the William collector sewer over the course of 2015 and 2016. It's a truly enormous project – and one aiming for LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Gold certification.

Some great archaeological discoveries

This summer, thousands of objects were turned up during the latest archaeological dig campaign carried out beneath Place D'Youville by the Ethnoscop team. Meanwhile, work to analyze the material culture is continuing. Researchers are closely examining tens of thousands of artifacts and bone fragments collected over the 13 years of work by the Université de Montréal Archaeological Field School at this location. Numerous exceptional finds point to this being a nationally significant 17th-century site – dating from the days of Maisonneuve and Jeanne Mance.



Two new pieces for the Complex

This planned legacy for the city's 375th anniversary will feature two highlights:

- 1) A new pavilion will be built on the site of Fort Ville-Marie and Callière's Residence to showcase the remains and artifacts from Montréal's earliest days, in the mid-17th century, as well as the very site where the Great Peace of Montréal was signed in 1701;
- 2) the former William collector sewer, dating from 1832, in the bed of the Little Saint-Pierre River, will be rebuilt to connect the new pavilion with the Museum's main building. Nothing like this has ever been done in Montréal! It's guaranteed to be a thrilling experience. And it is a legacy of which Montrealers will be justifiably proud – a place where they will be able to remember, contemplate and come face to face with the past.

THE MAYOR WHO PRESERVED MONTRÉAL'S BIRTHPLACE AND MADE IT ACCESSIBLE

Among the many achievements attributed to Jean Doré, Montréal's Mayor from 1986 to 1994, the name of Pointe-à-Callière, the Montréal Museum of Archaeology and History, comes up often – with good reason! The Museum, located in Old Montréal, was officially opened on May 17, 1992 in conjunction with the city's 350th anniversary celebrations.

An ardent defender of our history

Mayor Doré was one of the first and most vocal proponents of building Pointe-à-Callière in order to preserve and showcase Montréal's birthplace and to bring people to know and appreciate our city's history. This achievement was the fruit of a model partnership that saw city and federal and provincial government teams work together to carry out an ambitious project and deliver it on time.

There could be no more symbolic location to celebrate Montréal's 350th anniversary. At the urging of Mayor Doré, the federal and provincial governments decided to pool their efforts and invest in a joint project on four sites chosen for the future Pointe-à-Callière museum, and ensured that the new institution was ready for this important anniversary.

It was with much emotion and pride that Mayor Doré, along with Canadian Prime Minister the Right Honourable Brian Mulroney, Quebec Premier Robert Bourassa and numerous French government ministers and dignitaries, officially opened this new museum, on May 17, 1992. As the only large-scale archaeology museum in Canada, it has become a must-see tourist attraction in the cultural metropolis of Montréal. Initially designed for 150,000 visitors annually, today Pointe-à-Callière gets nearly 400,000, including some 100,000 young people and many, many Montrealers who have become very fond and proud of their Museum.

Thanks to his vision, love of Montréal, sense of history and leadership, Jean Doré helped preserve and showcase Montréal's birthplace and the traces of its earliest settlers and, along with his partners, created an invaluable legacy for future generations.

From the Pointe à Callière site to Île Notre-Dame

Did you know that there is even a direct connection between Pointe-à-Callière and the beach named for Doré at Jean Drapeau park? At the time, once the archaeological sites had been excavated, they were entirely covered with compacted sand to protect them during construction. Once the Museum was built on top of the remains, the archaeologists took up their trowels, whisks and other tools and resumed their work, once again uncovering the remains protected by the sand. All that sand was collected and removed from the Museum, then trucked to Île Notre-Dame, where it was used to create the "plage Doré." A great example of reuse and recycling!

A major legacy for the future

Pointe-à-Callière, a gift to Montrealers, Quebeckers and all Canadians, continues to evolve and attract interest from visitors from near and far, offering them a unique and unforgettable chance to visit Montréal's birthplace, the very spot where it all began for our city.

When Mr. Doré died on June 15 of this year, there was much talk in the media about his role in creating the Montréal Museum of Archaeology and History. Francine Lelièvre, Pointe-à-Callière's Executive Director, has publicly expressed her thanks to Mr. Doré on numerous occasions for his indispensable support, and Pointe-à-Callière is currently preparing to pay him tribute in a way that will ensure that his name and the Museum's remain indelibly linked. ◀




Queen of Crime

Agatha Christie's work includes 66 mystery novels, 6 novels, 150 short stories, 18 plays and 2 memoirs. She is the world's most-translated author, far surpassing Jules Verne: her writing has been translated into over 100 languages and sold 2 billion copies – only the Bible is more popular. Dubbed the Queen of Crime, she created such unforgettable characters as detectives Hercule Poirot and Miss Marple, and her colossal body of work has inspired numerous films and television series.

An exceptional woman for her time

The Museum's goal with this exhibition is to introduce visitors to a new side of Agatha Christie: an imaginative woman with many interests, an avid traveller and explorer, very open to other cultures. The exhibition will be chronological, from Agatha Mary Clarissa Miller's birth in Torquay, Devon, on September 15, 1890, to her death at her home in Wallingford, near Oxford, in January 1976. Christie herself will accompany visitors along the tour route, featuring some of her personal effects and memories very often recounted in her own voice. They will also be invited inside her different homes, including Ashfield, Winterbrook and Greenway House, and aboard the Orient Express, the mythical train that she herself rode and used as the setting for one of her most famous mysteries. The exhibition will end with a highly significant, moving and priceless artifact: the Remington 1937 typewriter that Christie used.

Starting in December, Pointe-à-Callière will be presenting Investigating Agatha Christie, an original exhibition focusing on an exceptional woman whose unusual life and compelling novels left their mark on international literature. The exhibition will look at Agatha Christie through her work, her imagination and her world, including archaeology. It is one of the major international events planned to mark the 125th anniversary of the famous novelist's birth.

A passion for archaeology

Few people are aware that the life and work of this imaginative and adventurous woman were intimately bound up with archaeology. Between 1930 and 1960, she witnessed some major finds at ancient Mesopotamian sites in Syria and Iraq. Archaeology played an important part in Christie's personal and professional life. She was married to an archaeologist, Sir Max Edgar Lucien Mallowan, who made an important contribution to the prehistoric chronology of Mesopotamia. Various artifacts unearthed during Mesopotamian digs led by her husband and other archaeologists or from places she visited in Egypt and the Middle East will be part of the exhibition. Many other archaeological treasures will also be displayed, from vases to bas-reliefs, figurines, jewellery, bronze plaques, cuneiform tablets, cylinder seals and objects made of ivory, along with manuscripts, photos and films taken by the author while she was on these dig sites.

Archaeologist vs. detective

Christie drew heavily on archaeology and history as inspiration for many of her famous novels, including Murder in Mesopotamia, They Came to Baghdad, Appointment with Death and Death Comes as the End. She also described daily life on dig sites in a fascinating little book entitled Come, Tell Me How You Live. She wrote that an archaeologist and a detective have much in common: both must

come to understand an event (recent or in the distant past) using their observation skills and clues that are brought to light, piecing them together and relying on a bit of luck, too! Investigating Agatha Christie will be a journey to a time when many of the treasures of mankind's heritage were discovered and an encounter with a passionate woman, a brilliant individual who invented a new literary genre: the historical detective novel.

Privileged access for Museum Members

Mathew Prichard, Christie's grandson, and Henrietta McCall, Guest Curator and British Museum representative, will be giving an exclusive talk for Members at the exhibition preview on Sunday, December 6, 2015.

All kinds of activities to complement the exhibition

To round out this unique exhibition, the Museum will also be hosting a wide variety of visitor activities, lectures, games and contests, and producing a publication to be available at the Museum Shop. There will be something for all ages! See the Museum website. The exhibition will be presented from December 8, 2015 to April 17, 2016. ◀



Exploring the Complex's Architectural Heritage

THE MARINERS' HOUSE ANCHORED IN HISTORY

The Mariners' House rises majestically in the heart of Old Montréal, at the corner of Place d'Youville and Place Royale. The building has served numerous functions since it first went up. Work started on a new incarnation in 2011 as it was harmoniously integrated into the historic district, culminating in 2012 with the opening of a fifth pavilion for Pointe-à-Callière.

Built for mariners

Let's go back in time... Starting in 1875 and for close to sixty years, the Montreal Sailors' Institute stood on this corner, welcoming merchant sailors stopping in Montréal. But the port became busier over the years and more and more sailors were arriving, so by 1940 the building had become rather cramped. During the Second World War, the Board of Directors commissioned architect C. R. Titley to draw up plans for a new building to meet the Institute's growing needs. The original building was demolished in 1953 and a new one went up over the next two years.

There is a commemorative plaque dated 1953 on the building, in fact, preserved when the Mariners' House was refurbished. But records show that the Montreal Sailors' Institute was officially inaugurated in 1954 by Lionel Chevrier, federal Transport Minister at the time, and Montréal Mayor Camillien Houde. Hundreds of thousands of sailors passed through the building over the years. They had access to lounges and games rooms, a chapel, a concert hall, left luggage, a post office, currency exchange, a barber shop and doctor's office, not to mention a cafeteria and beds. In 1968, the Montreal Sailors' Institute merged with the Catholic Sailors' Club to create the Mariners House.

A new vocation

In 1987, the Œuvres de la Maison du Père purchased the building to serve as a men's shelter, renovating and renaming it the "Résidence du Vieux-Port." The shelter was inaugurated in 1988 by Montréal Cardinal Paul Grégoire and remained in operation until 2004.

A new gathering place

In 2004, through the Pointe-à-Callière Foundation, the Museum purchased the building and began using it for school groups. In 2011, the building was included in Pointe-à-Callière's expansion plans, aimed at creating the Montréal Archaeology and History Complex. The building was refurbished by Dan S. Hanganu and Provencher Roy + Associés Architectes, the same consortium responsible in 1992 for the main Museum building (the "Éperon"), and the archaeological crypt beneath Place Royale. The building was now named the "Mariners' House" as a nod to its history.

A contemporary project built on traces from the past

The architects decided to make Pointe-à-Callière's fifth building a contemporary project with an urban flavour so that it would blend seamlessly with the Museum's Éperon building and the rest of the neighbourhood. They also chose to showcase the archaeological finds and history in the building's basement, while emphasizing a network of connected spaces making it easier for visitors to move between them. The façade on Place D'Youville incorporates a two-

storey glass curtain wall that floods the building with light and creates a sense of transparency, inviting passers-by to venture indoors and explore the new space. The lobby gives onto a monumental staircase with an original creation by Montréal artist Nicolas Baier, and also features a multimedia installation designed by Moment Factory, a Montréal firm. The window-lined spaces on Floors 3 and 4 offer superb views of the Old Port, the St. Lawrence River and Old Montréal.

Architecture that combines the seafaring past with the present

The Mariners' House is strategically located along the visitor tour route through the Museum, set between two public squares that have witnessed so much of the city's history: Place D'Youville and Place Royale. What makes the site so special is that it is set in the heart of the 18th-century historic district, at the confluence of the St. Lawrence River, the former Little St. Pierre River and the William collector sewer. The building's architecture and the way it blends in are at once a salute to the building's past and a tribute to its modern face as part of the historic district, just as the Éperon building is now recognized as one of the city's most striking landmarks.

Accessible architecture for a new, popular gathering place

The architects designed the new building to be accessible by day, visible by night and pleasant to visit and use year round. This new centre devoted to history and archaeology allows the Museum to continue hosting major exhibitions, lectures and special events, in addition to housing a unique education space, the Archaeo-Adventure workshop, with its simulated archaeological digs.

Spectacular exhibitions

Since it opened the new building, the Museum has been able to present a number of major international exhibitions, some of which have beaten attendance records: The Etruscans – An Ancient Italian Civilization, The Greeks – Agamemnon to Alexander the Great and The Aztecs, People of the Sun.

Today he is active with the Museum Foundation, after sitting on the Museum's Board of Trustees for a decade. Normally poised and reserved, he becomes animated when talk turns to history. Join us for a conversation with someone with a passion for the past.

Why did you decide to start working with Pointe-à-Callière?

I'm a history and archaeology buff. The Museum plays an essential role in teaching people about history – not only Montréal's history but also that of the whole world, as it did with the exhibitions on the Greeks and on the Aztecs. We are citizens of the world who live in a global village, and the Museum recognizes that fact whenever it hosts an exhibition on one of the major civilizations, whether it's from Peru or the steppes, for instance.

Where did you get your interest in history?

I grew up in politics and so it was only natural for me to be interested in history. My grandfather, Simon-Napoléon Parent, was a Quebec Premier; he was close to Wilfrid Laurier. My father was a Member of Parliament. After he died, my mother married a senator, Louis Gélinas. I recently dined with the grandson of Louis-Alexandre Taschereau [who succeeded my grandfather as Premier]!

Travel also gave me a taste for history. I was very young when I began travelling. My father sent me to Europe at age 15 with some Americans to reward me for my good grades. Europe certainly sparks curiosity! That trip also made me appreciate Quebec. At 17, I went back to France, mostly the western part of the country, where our ancestors were from. In my early 20s, I visited Spain. The next year, in 1965, I headed off on a world tour.

You're a history buff, but you work in finance. Is there a connection?

Finance is part of the world of politics, which builds on what one did previously. It's all part of the same thing. In the financial world, we're interested in everything that makes people tick!

I studied Canadian and European history at university. After that, I switched to finance and went on to become a stockbroker with Lévesque, Beaubien, which later became National Bank Financial.

I've always been keen on history. I've also been a collector for years. I've amassed a French Revolution collection and another on Canadian history. I've been able to donate my collection of items



relating to Canadian history, mostly books, to Pointe-à-Callière. I also have a collection of books on French painters and another of etchings by Jacques Villon.

Why is Pointe-à-Callière so important?


The site itself is remarkable – the river, the fortifications, the first Catholic cemetery — and then there are the temporary exhibitions. The Museum's attendance figures are proof that its mission meets a real need.

People complain that school curricula don't place enough emphasis on history, that they don't talk about it enough, because people don't know their history. The Museum fills that gap and does so in a way that's appealing to kids.

The Museum is important for tourists, too, and for people who have come here from elsewhere. I was delighted the other day to see some Mexicans at the Museum, because one of our missions is to integrate people who have immigrated to Quebec from around the globe.

Before producing the exhibition on the Greeks, the Museum had ones on Southern Italy and the Etruscans, generating interest in the Italian community. The Dead Sea Scrolls exhibition had a similar result. We owe it all to our Executive Director, Francine Lelièvre, for creating a Museum that adapts to Montréal's reality as a city of trade, transition and innovation.


